The Book of Enoch – Chapter 77



Enoch was the son of Jared, the father of Methuselah, and the great-grandfather of Noah. It is believed that Enoch was born in 3328 BC, 622 years after the birth of Adam. The Bible states that Enoch lived 365 years before he was taken by God.

The Book of Enoch, written during the second century B.C. is one of the most important non-canonical apocryphal works, and had a huge influence on early Christian beliefs, specifically among Gnostic believers, and those that truly believed in divine salvation.

Enoch is believed to have had direct contact with God's most holy of angels, and describes visions of heaven and hell, angelic beings and devils, and introduced concepts such as fallen angels, the Luminaries, the Nephilim, the Watchers, and the appearance of a Messiah, Resurrection, a Final Judgement, and a Heavenly Kingdom on Earth. Interspersed with this material are scientific digressions on calendrical systems, geography, cosmology, astronomy, and meteorology.

Chapter 77

P1. And the first quarter is called the east, because it is the first: and the second, the south, because the Most High will descend there, yea, there in quite a special sense will He who is blessed forever descended.

P2. And the west quarter is named the diminished, because there all the luminaries of the heaven wane and go down.

P3. And the fourth quarter, named the north, is divided into three parts: the first of them is for the dwelling of Humans, and the second contains seas of water, and the abysses and forests and rivers, and

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P3. darkness and clouds; and the third part contains the garden of righteousness.

P4. I saw seven high mountains, higher than all the mountains which are on the earth, and thence comes forth hoar-frost, and days, seasons, and years pass away.

P5. I saw seven rivers on the earth larger than all the rivers, one of them coming from the west pours its waters into the Great Sea.

P6. And these two come from the north to the sea, and pour their waters into the Erythraean Sea in the east.

P7. And the remaining four come forth on the side of the north to their own sea, two of them to the Erythraean Sea, and two into the Great Sea and discharge themselves there and some say, into the desert.

P8. Seven great islands I saw in the sea and in the mainland, two in the mainland and five in the Great Sea.
