About Demonization:

For a person's life to become negatively disrupted through demonization, they must first succumb to temptation, and temptation can come in many different forms.

In order for a person to be tempted, there must be an area or place that's infested with a demon or demons. A demon must find a location to dwell in and attach itself to something within that environment.

For example, a demon might locate a building, like a nightclub, and will reside within that specific building or a demon might locate an automobile and reside within that specific automobile.



Then, when a person enters where the demon is dwelling, they become susceptible to temptation. To understand this, lets look at a typical situation. In searching for a dwelling place, a demon has selected a beautiful new expensive car displayed in an automobile dealer's showroom; the car is now infested with that demon.

Then, as people stroll by and begin to look at the car, some will admire it and will set in it or take it for a test drive. The demon waits patiently for the right person to tempt, usually someone that is emotionally or spiritually weak in their character and is attracted to material objects.

The demon will then tempt the person by appealing to their ego and pride, using suggestive telepathic thoughts, and will coerce the person into purchasing the car, even though their income level is not high enough for them to afford the monthly payments.

Then, afterwards, as the months begin to pass, the person struggles to make the payments and financial stress begins to dominate their life. This leads the person into experiencing fits of frustration, depression and anger as the financial pressure grinds away at them, and this enables the demon to continue to bring further negative havoc in the person's life.

This is just one of thousands of examples of how demonization can disrupt a person's life.



Lets take a moment to remember and evaluate the temptation of Jesus Christ:

Matthew 4:1-4:11:

After Jesus baptism, he was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by Satan. After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was exceedingly hungry.

The tempter (Satan) knowing he was in a vulnerable state came to him and said:

"If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread, which you may eat." Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'

Then Satan took him to the holy city and had him stand on the highest point of the temple. "If you are the Son of God," he said, "throw yourself down. For it is written":

He will command his angels concerning you, and they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone.'



Jesus answered him, "It is also written: 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.' Again, Satan took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendor. "All this I will give you," he said, "if you will bow down and worship me."

Jesus said to him, "Away from me, Satan! For it is written: 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.' Then Satan left him, and angels came and attended him.

Jesus Christ, as a mortal human being, and because of his spiritual faith and wisdom, was clearly able to overcome and defeat temptation.

We know, as children of God, we can conquer temptation through prayer, however, there is one thing which takes the weapon of prayer out of our hands, and that is sin, engaging in iniquitous acts.

When we engage in sinful iniquitous activities, God will not hear our prayers. Satan knows this, and this is one reason why he works so hard at tempting Christians to sin.

Every Christian should learn to overcome iniquitous temptations, because we will all be tempted.

However, by God's grace, we can overcome temptation. While Satan does indeed tempt us to commit sin, he cannot force us to sin, we sin by the way of our own free will.

Remember, temptation is not sin. The Lord Jesus was tempted, and we know that He did not sin. The Bible states that He was "in all measure, tempted just as we are, yet without sin."

We need to be clear on understanding this point, that temptation is not a sin. Satan likes to condemn Christians even when they have not sinned. He likes to make them feel guilty for having been tempted by some iniquitous activity, but it is not a sin to be tempted.



Sin happens when we say "yes" to the temptation. We sin when we give in to temptation. The Bible speaks of some sins which are outward sins, and it speaks of other sins which are inward sins.

By outward sins, outward meaning such sins as using profanity, lying, stealing, immorality, drunkenness and murder. No Christian should be guilty of these sins. If these sins are still in a person's life, then there is no evidence that person has been born again in Christ.

However, its sad to say, that most Christians, as well as unsaved people are guilty of inward sins, inward meaning such sins as pride, jealousy, envy, selfishness, unforgiveness, hatred and lust. These are the secret sins which the eye of man cannot see. But God sees them, and they are hateful in His sight. Therefore, we must learn how to have victory over them.

Every Christian has a besetting sin. This is the sin that you are most tempted with. Satan knows your weakest point, and this is where he tempts you most. To have victory over this sin and the other sins in your life, you must learn how to overcome temptation.

As Christians, its important to realize that we have been delivered from the kingdom of darkness where sin reigns. How were we delivered? We were delivered by our death with Christ. God put us in Christ on the cross. When Christ died, we died with Him; when He was buried, we were buried with Him; when He rose again, we rose again with Him.

What does this mean?

It means that in Christ, we have been set free from the kingdom of darkness where sin reigns. We are no longer under the authority of sin. This is a great fact, and we are to count on it.

However, we have within us a sin principle which is always trying to pull us down into sin. This is why the Bible calls it "the law of sin."

We cannot overcome the law of sin by our own individual efforts, so God, through his mercy is willing to deliver us from sin's power.

How Does God Deliver Us?

God delivers us by giving us Christ. His life overcomes the law of sin and death in us. Therefore, by accepting Jesus Christ in our life and having faith in him, we can be delivered from our sins. This is God's promise to humanity.
